

Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1995

- 1. Privacy regulations—Start date April, 2003
- 2. Electronic Transactions—
 Start date October, 2003 if an extension was filed
- 3. Security regulations—Start two years after final rules are published



A Consumer is a person who uses health care

A provider is an entity that gives health care

Protected Health Information (PHI) contains identifiable information including name and diagnosis

A health plan is an entity that pays for health care

Consumer Rights – Confidentiality Currently Governed by:

- State law
- Other Federal laws
- HIPAA

(Whatever law is most strict is the one to comply with)

Consumer Rights to Access to Medical Records

- Medical records -except psychotherapy notes and law enforcement records or civil litigation
- Expect a decision to release or deny records within 30 days
- If access denied, must receive written reasons
- Consumer may request log of releases once a year



Consumer Rights Disclosure Restrictions

Restrict some information from disclosure or to certain individuals





Consumer Rights Minimum Necessary

The minimum of information necessary should be conveyed to the requestor – not the whole file

Consumer Rights

 To receive "Notice of Privacy Practices" – when and how PHI will be disclosed



Consumer Rights Health Care Confidentiality

- Communications between employees
- Written communication
- Oral Communication
- Electronic communication

Consumer Rights Complaint Practices



Right to file a complaint if they believe their rights have been violated


 Determine if you are a provider of medical services.





Guard the privacy of clients and employees on health issues



- Communications received from employees regarding health conditions are not covered
- Communications received from health insurance carrier about employees are covered








Storage issues...

Complete the new paperwork required to get or give protected health information (PHI)


Provider Duties "Universal Precautions"

- Utilize "universal precautions"
- Remind others to use "universal precautions" in situations where you know or suspect there may be a possibility of blood borne or airborne diseases.

Maintain a log of released information for 6 years



Take care with conversations about medical issues, e.g. elevators, halls, open doors



- Information learned in the employment relationship is not covered by HIPAA; also worker's compensation records.
- Information learned as a plan sponsor is covered and cannot be used in making employment decisions.

Penalties for Non-Compliance

- Federal Law
 - Civil monetary penalties
 - Criminal penalties:
 - Unintended releases
 - False pretenses
 - Commercial gain


Penalties for Non-Compliance

- Within Polk County
 - Possible discipline, particularly for intentional violations

(Generally we have a good record of maintaining confidentiality of consumers)

Permissible Reports

- FDA reports
- Communicable Disease
- Reports of child abuse, domestic abuse or dependent abuse if required by law




Permissible Reports

- Providers should report health information if there is an immediate threat to the health and safety of an individual
- Secret Service protection of the president



Permissible Reports

- Wounds required by law to be reported
- Court orders
- Subpoenas if the information is relevant and material to a legitimate law enforcement inquiry and de-identified information cannot reasonably be used



Law Enforcement Reports

- Death
- Law enforcement may communicate with medial examiner or funeral director
- Crime on premises



Polk County Action Steps

- Convened HIPAA Work Group for the purpose of developing a work plan.
- Develop a policy statement for the implementation of HIPAA county-wide and seek BOS endorsement of resolution adopting the policy.
- Offer training for all county units on the impact of the policy statement in modifying behavior.

Polk County Impact

If you identify changes which need to be made in your work area or in your job duties, contact your department's privacy officer.



Why bother?

- Counties have a wide variety of confidential, personal information about people, including medical information.
- Some sensitive information is required to be given in order to receive services or to qualify for county activities
- Even the unintentional release of personal information may be harmful to the individual

Why bother?

- As our society becomes more complex, the danger of unintended release of information increases.
- Congress is concerned about the need to be more careful in the storage and handling of sensitive health information. There will soon be new "rules of the game" for providers and insurance companies. Counties need to keep up.
